Mainland Nova Scotia Building Trades Council Update

The Mainland Nova Scotia Building Trades Council's mandate includes promoting and developing business for our 11,000 members, and providing a united voice on issues affecting the professional trades. Our last article highlighted the importance of the work we do around government relations. This month, we're highlighting our advocacy work around Community Benefits Programs.

Over the last several months, we have been discussing the benefits of community benefits programs with municipal, provincial and federal stakeholders as a best value procurement approach. Community benefits are a tool to help local communities organize and leverage public infrastructure investments to create employment and apprenticeship opportunities.

Various levels of government have used community benefits agreements (CBAs) to incorporate community benefits provisions in infrastructure projects and programs. CBAs help to ensure public projects are completed on time and on budget, while providing benefits to the communities in which they are built. However, in Nova Scotia the "lowest bid" is still prevalent in much of our public procurement.

There are many examples of CBAs that would benefit members of Local 83, and the other 12 affiliated Locals of the Building Trades:

- Requirement for a percentage of the workforce be apprentices building the workforce for tomorrow;
- Requirement for a local workforce ensuring those at home get to work;
- Requirement for a percentage of under-represented groups ensuring those groups including women and youth that experience higher than average unemployment get the opportunity to advance their skills;
- Paying fair wages and benefits, so bidding is based on safety and productivity, not discounted labour rates.

When there is a focus on best value procurement, Building Trades Unions are right for the job and able to deliver.
